## Our History

The Coogee Community Garden WA was founded by a group of residents who had the passion and vision for creating a garden accessible to all. The group was incorporated on the 15 November 2018 and a license agreement for the garden land area at Rotary Park was signed with the City of Cockburn on 9 June 2021. The first community planting day was held on 7 August 2021 at a “turning of the sod ceremony”. Following this, the garden quickly took shape with the development of a community shed, access pathways and an outdoor gazebo area. The official opening day for the garden is planned for Saturday 15 October 2022.

## Aboriginal Six Seasons

### Birak (December - January)

During Birak season the rain eases and the warm weather really starts to take hold. The afternoons are cooled by the sea breezes from the south west.

Traditionally this was the fire season. An almost clockwork style of easterly winds in the morning and sea breezes in the afternoon meant that this was burning time of the year for Noongar people and they would burn the country in mosaic patterns.

### Bunuru (February - March)

Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Hot easterly winds continue with a cooling sea breeze most afternoons – if you're close to the coast.

Traditionally this was, and still is, a great time for living and fishing by the coast, rivers and estuaries. Because of this, freshwater foods and seafood made up major parts of the Noongar people's diet during Bunuru.

### Djeran (April - May)

Djeran season sees a break in the really hot weather. A key indicator of the change of season is the cool nights that bring a dewy presence in the early mornings.

The winds will also change, especially in their intensity, with light breezes generally swinging from southerly directions. Many flying ants can be seen cruising around in the light winds

### Makuru (June - July)

Makuru sees the coldest and wettest time of the year in the South West. Traditionally, this was a good time of the year to move back inland from the coast as the winds turned to the west and south bringing the cold weather, rains and occasionally snow on the peaks of the Stirling and Porongurup Ranges.

### Djilba (August - September)

This is the start of the massive flowering explosion that happens in the South West. Beginning with the yellow flowering plants such as the acacias. Djilba is a transitional time of the year, with some very cold and clear days combining with warmer, rainy and windy days mixing with the occasional sunny day or two.

### Kambarang (October - November)

The Noongar Season 'Kambarang' is represented by the colour yellow as it symbolises the return of the hot weather. During Kambarang season, we see an abundance of colours and flowers exploding all around us.
